



## 2013 NW/MET Conference

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## Program

The NW/MET 2013 conference will provide two options for participation. We'll have two different unconference cycles where participants will select topics or areas of need to address together, scope the problem and propose a plan for attacking it, and then work together to create a useful deliverable to give back to the organization. There will be two topics selected in each cycle, for a total of four. We'll also have one track of traditional conference sessions. "Lightning round" sessions made up of several five-minute presentations on a variety of topics will both seed thinking for the un-conference cycles as well as be part of the traditional conference track.

The conference rate (\$265 plus \$35 annual NW/MET dues) includes lunch all three days, and dinner on Wednesday and Thursday. Both dinners will be at off-campus locations, including a Thursday night dinner cruise on Flathead Lake. Breakfast is included in the Holiday Inn Express room rate.

## Schedule Key





## How the “Unconference” Will Work

During the conference, there will be two unconference cycles. Each will begin with a lightning round session to help seed thinking. After the lightning rounds, participants will brainstorm topics or areas of need to address together by providing input on a shared physical or virtual whiteboard space. From the ideas generated we'll identify commonalities and generate questions around them, ultimately selecting two topics to address during the unconference cycle.

For the first half of the cycle, participants will join the group investigating one or the other of the topics and participate in scoping the problem, proposing a plan for attacking it, and determine a useful deliverable that the group can produce to share with the NW/MET organization. For example, the group might choose to create a white paper, or to develop a simple prototype. Although each group will have a pre-determined facilitator, the group will define their own processes and ground rules. After this first phase of the unconference cycle, the groups will convene together and each group will present their plans to the NW/MET body.

During the second half of the cycle, each group will execute their plan around their topic and develop their product. They will then present their work to the NW/MET body, and provide some ideas for how the organization can continue to build upon this work.
